From the beginning of the bid process through to the closing ceremonies, Furlong was relentless in his pursuit to deliver a games that touched all Canadians and the world. Furlong continues to champion amateur sports and his belief in the power of the human spirit to overcome adversity. His account of leading the 2010 Games and the challenges and opportunities he faced before and since are both deeply personal and characteristically frank. Through masterful storytelling, he inspires audiences to develop a more humble, human, raw and emotional approach to leadership. Always a passionate ambassador for Canada, Furlong has been recognized with numerous awards and honours including: the Order of Canada; Order of British Columbia; Canadian of the year, Marketer of the Year and Sport Executive of the Year. What will the impact of so many changes in elected officials mean for municipal departments? The Parks and Recreation sector often struggles with a lack of credibility in the eyes of City Councils, particularly around budget times, so how can we educate the decision makers about the value of our services? In her role as a former Department head of Development Services and now as Chief Administrative Officer, Lisa will share what she has learned about how to deal with new Mayors and Councils as well as existing members of Council. We live in a colonial society and have inherited colonialism as a framework for how we govern, how we make decisions, and how we provide services in parks and recreation. Increased recognition of the need to address Reconciliation is a great start, but aside from educating ourselves about Canada's history with Indigenous peoples, what can we do?</p> <p>This session is for us to discuss parks and recreation's importance in creating social equity. Find out what it means to "decolonize" and position yourself in a longer historical context.
